"During my sophomore year in high school, I took an interest test, and speech and language pathology came in off the charts," she said as she marks her thirteenth year as Meadowbrook's speech therapist.

Coincidentally, Mrs. Kosnik's husband had attended Meadowbrook, and her grad school roommate was a violin teacher at the school, so she was familiar with it. She works consistently with about 50 students and also runs social groups with the school social worker treating children for anything that impacts communication.

They enjoy the convenience of living right behind the public pool and walk there frequently. Mrs. Kosnik says her daughter loves to swim and calls her "a fish."
